FRAGILE CHILDREN, ALLERGIES, LIFE-THREATENING ILLNESS, ETC. Mar 23, 7 p.m. Central (\$15)

Who would know the child pictured here would have any "fragile" concerns! She has spina bifida, a condition that usually makes it necessary to provide protection to the spine during a photo session. You may encounter other serious disorders such as brittle bone disease, pica or prader willi. Television's medical detective dramas like to feature these bizarre, but real, plots. These and many other "fragile" conditions such as cancer will be addressed in this webinar.



CEREBRAL PALSY AND OTHER PHYSICAL CONCERNS Apr 27, 7 p.m. Central (\$15)

You'll be surprised at all the things to consider when you have a photo session with a child who is in a wheelchair. Learn correct terminology and how to access "triggers" to capture that endearing image for the walls of the family who had nothing to show before you came along. Other topics to be discussed are dwarfism, amputation, disproportional body parts and a few others.
